The Satellites for Whom We've Named Our Short Film Programs

Omid — Iran's first domestically made satellite is also the Persian name for "hope." Launched on February 2, 2009, this data-processing satellite was made for research and telecommunications.

Telstar — Launched by NASA on July 10,1962 this privately sponsored satellite relayed the world's first transatlantic television signal. It was a precursor for today's global telecommunication networks. The first images it transmitted included those of President John F. Kennedy, Mount Rushmore and an American flag waving in the wind.

Asterix — Named after a French comics character, this was France's first satellite. The satellite's purpose was to test the rocket Diamant's launcher. While other satellites are no longer in use, Asterix continues to orbit the earth and is expected to do so for centuries.

Helios — This joint effort between NASA and the German Aerospace Center launched a pair of probes into heliocentric orbit to study solar processes. The first probe was launched on December 10, 1974 and the second on January 15, 1976. Though no longer functional, they remain in elliptical orbits around the sun.

Hisaki — The Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency launched this satellite on September 14, 2013. This astronomy satellite is used to observe the ultraviolet light of the solar system planets.

Danuri — This newer satellite launched less than a year ago on August 4, 2022 is the Republic of South Korea's first lunar orbiter. In addition to being a technology demonstrator, this satellite will survey lunar resources like water, ice, uranium and helium in order to produce a topographical map to select future lunar landing sites.

Morelos — The first in a series of Mexican communications satellites was launched June 17, 1985. The purpose of these satellites was to provide telephony, data and television services over the territory of the Mexican Republic and adjacent areas. This was Mexico's first venture into using satellites.

ArgoMoon — This unique miniaturized satellite known as a CubeSat was launched on November 16, 2022. The objective of this satellite is to take detailed images of the Interim Cryogenic Propulsion Stage following separation of the Orion spacecraft.

Nahuel — This communications satellite known as a Spacebus came out of Argentina and was launched on January 30, 1987 holding its relative position in geosynchronous orbit.

Ariel — Named after a sprite in Shakespeare's *The Tempest*, this joint mission between the United States and Great Britain was launched on April 26, 1962. The satellite's purpose was to provide X-ray data for solar flares..

Original Japanese cut in 35mm. Directed by Inoshiro Honda. Folks who have only seen the Raymond Burr version may be surprised at how sober and serious this uncut, subtitled edition is. Honda was an assistant to the great Akira Kurosawa and he brings along actor Takashi Shimura as Dr. Yamane who tries to figure out how and why an ancient radioactive beast is wreaking havoc in post-war Japan. Akira Ifukube's landmark score has been used and re-interpretated throughout the history of the title beast's movies for decades since. *Godzilla* has previously shown at SF8 (1983) and SF30 (2005) —both times in this original version.

03:00 a.m. Future Kill 1985 • United States • 1h 29m • Rated X in 1985 • 35mm

The poster for *Future Kill* was designed by H.R. Giger. The artist's signature work and the re-uniting of the original *Texas Chainsaw Massacre* stars Edwin Neal and Marilyn Burns were the biggest selling points of this Texas-shot *Road Warrior* meets *Animal House* thriller. The cast also includes soon-to-be Leatherface Bill Johnson (*Texas Chainsaw Massacre 2*) and future Oscar nominee John Hawkes in his debut. Directed by Ronald W. Moore.

04:30 a.m. La Jetée 1962 · France · 28m · Not Rated

Directed by Chris Marker, *La Jetée* was recently named to the Sight & Sound list of the greatest films ever made. A brilliant time travel, mind expanding film comprised almost entirely of still images. Even at 28 minutes, Marker creates a stunning film, which has been influential ever since (including Terry Gilliam's adaptation *12 Monkeys*).


